## A complicated railroad history...


- Northwestern Pacific Railroad (completed 1914)

- SMART 2012











- SB 1029 approved May 30, 2018 by Senate 36-1
- Governor signs SB 1029 September 30, 2018
- Willits-Cloverdale to SMART
- Senator Michael McGuire: "...create a Great Redwood Trail for hiking, biking, and riding, that may be in the public and economic best interests of the north coast."
- Transportation Agency (Caltrans) in consultation with Natural Resource Agency to conduct an Assessment by July 2020
- Prioritization of southern section assessment



## The Great Redwood Trail

#### SB 1029:

- A preliminary assessment of the viability of constructing a trail on the entirety of, or a portion of, the property, rights-of-way, or easements owned by the North Coast Railroad Authority, and recommendations relating to the possible construction of a trail, including both of the following:
- (A) Options for railbanking and the governance structure or ownership structure for a new or successor entity that is necessary to railbank property, rights-of-way, and easements along the rail corridor.
- (B) A preliminary assessment of which portions of the terrain along the rail corridor may be suitable for a trail.



# The Great Redwood Trail

### **Updates:**

- SB 356 transfers assets south of Willits to the Sonoma-Marin Area Rail Transit (SMART) district.
- April 10, 2019: NCRA Board approves settlement of lawsuits with environmental groups over old EIR
- April 11, 2019: Assembly Budget Subcommittee approved the Administration's budget proposal for \$3 million to complete process identified in SB 1029
- \$1.5 million for a property assessment
- \$500,000 to assess debt, lawsuits
- \$1 million for preliminary trail assessment


#### **Pacific Crest Trail**

- Proposed by Clinton Clarke as part of Pacific Crest Trail System Conference 1935-1938
- Joint effort with Clarke, Boy Scouts, YMCA, and Ansel Adams
- 2,000 mile route planned by YMCA groups
- 1968 LB Johnson defined the PCT and Appalachia Trail in the National Trails Systems Act.
- Constructed by volunteers and the Federal government
- Finished in 1993; TPL has added public lands along route




#### **Tahoe Rim Trail**

- 1981: Glen Hampton, USFS Recreation Officer, envisions 150mile loop trail
- 1982: Granted non-profit status
- 2001: Trail completed with 200,000 volunteer hours
- 2003: 96 miles of TRT dedicated as a National Recreation Trail






# Katy Trail, Missouri: 240 miles



# The Great Redwood Trail

#### **Potential Goals**

- A continuous trail within the NWP corridor
- Protect <u>safety/privacy</u> of adjacent landowners
- Make trail <u>accessible</u> to wide variety of users
- Restore/enhance environment, esp. stream habitat
- Improve emergency vehicle access
- Enhance local <u>economies</u>
- Restore/maintain <u>railroad infrastructure</u> to extent feasible
- Trail design to reflect feasibility, environment, safety needs
- Provide adequate <u>support facilities</u> esp. in isolated areas
- Prohibit fires during fire season







## **Preliminary Usage/Benefits Analysis**


When completed, the Great Redwood Trail will:
